There is fee reduction plans available for eligible patients, including the Dental Pass program and incomeadjusted sliding scale fees. Appointments are preferred, but walk-ins are welcome.

DEVELOPMENTAL AND BEHAVIORAL PEDIATRICIANS

Developmental and Behavioral Pediatricians are doctors that specialize in diagnosing and managing developmental conditions and can follow children into adulthood to offer ongoing guidance and support. Families may want to consider adding these specialists to their child's care team, in addition to primary care doctors and other specialists. These specialists can also conduct evaluations for Autism or other developmental and behavioral challenges. Most work within an interdisciplinary team which often includes specialists from a range of disciplines such as: physicians, psychiatrists, psychologists, and therapists.

DIAPERS AND TOILETING RESOURCES

The Diaper Program

(For children 3 years of age or older)

Medicaid covered diaper and wipes program for children 3 years of age or older that utilize diapers due to a developmental delay or medical reason.

1.Call the member services number of your child's Medicaid health insurance provider (this is usually the number written on the back of your medical card).

2.Ask the insurance provider what Durable Medical Equipment (DME) Company they contract with that can provide diapers for children in your area and get the name and phone number of that company.

3.Call the equipment company and explain that you want to get your child on the diaper program. They will do an intake with you over the phone and then they will ask you to call your doctor and have the doctor fax a prescription for diapers and wipes to them. Ask for the equipment company's fax number.

4.Call your doctor's office and explain that you need to fax a prescription for diapers directly to the equipment company. The prescription needs to include the child's size and diagnosis.

5.Soon you will begin to receive diapers each month. You will need to renew this process each year if your child continues to need them.

6.If you do not receive the diapers and wipes please call the Medical Equipment Company to check in with them.
